

How to Make a No-Sew Face Mask

Even as the Stay-At-Home order in Indiana starts to loosen, when you go out for essentials you may want to wear a face mask, but face masks are hard to buy and not everyone can sew. Here's an easy no-sew face mask:

1. Lay out a bandana or cut a 22"x 22" square of cotton fabric



- 2. Place a piece of flat coffee filter in the center (optional)
- 3. Fold the top and bottom in towards the center, Then again, fold the top and bottom in towards the center

4. Optional: Place a twist tie, paper clip, or other flexible metal piece close to the top center inside the folded material so you can form it to your nose bridge

Fold side to the middle and tuck

5. Fold the sides in towards the center, placing your ties at the folded crease. If you're using rubber bands or hair ties, loop these around the fabric. If you're using shoelaces or string, place the center of the string in the folded

crease and pull the straps tight. Tuck one end of the fabric into the other. Or staple/clip the side folds.



6. Lift the mask to your face and secure the straps. For hair ties and rubber

bands, loop them over each ear. For shoelaces and string, tie them behind your head

about 6 inches apart

7. Adjust as needed, making sure your mouth and nose are completely covered. If you put some metal inside the last fold, adjust it to fit the top of your nose (bridge).

Time and time again, with burdens weighing heavily on their hearts and in their many necessities, the Christian faithful have sought refuge under your mantle of protection. Come quickly to our aid at this time, Mother of Mercy, and deliver us from the dangers that surround us in our hour of need; watch over especially the elderly, the weak and the infirm, our children and the unity of our families, and all those who give of themselves selflessly in pastoral care to those in need until in your arms and in your gentle embrace we all find safety and solace. Once there was a young man who became a Christian many years ago. His rich pagan father despised him for this. He argued with his son, beat him, and then finally threw him out of the house. The young man remained a devout Christian and won many others to Christ as well. Eventually, the young man was brought before the magistrate, and was accused of being a Christian.

The magistrate offered him a choice. First, he would release him if he would simply renounce Christ, come home and enjoy his father's wealth. Or, he could remain a Christian and be put to death. "Leaving my father's riches does not trouble me," said the young man, "for there is a far more beautiful home waiting for me with my Heavenly Father." This Thursday, we will celebrate the feast of Our Lord's return to His Heavenly Father. On Ascension Thursday, forty days after His Resurrection, Our Lord took His disciples to the Mount of Olives near Bethany, blessed them and was lifted in a cloud which took Him from their sight. The Feast of the Ascension of Our Lord reminds us of our final destination. Ultimately, we are all created to dwell with God in Heaven. While we journey on earth, however, God continues to share Himself with us by sending His Holy Spirit to us, to live within us and to work among us. Therefore, let us, on the Feast of the Ascension, anticipate the coming of the Holy Spirit into the world and into us in a renewed way.
