Who are Sts. Volodymyr and Olha?

St. Olha was born about 980 in . She was renowned for her wisdom and sobriety and was the wife of lhor, Great Prince of Kyiv, who ruled during the tenth century. After the Drevlyans murdered her husband, she took revenge on those people and had thousands murdered. As her son, Svyatoslav, was only three years old when his father died, Olha took the power into her hands, having the full support the Rus army, which attests to the great respect she held among the people. She ruled capably, and even after her son was of full age, since he preferred to engage in military campaigns, she was left to rule in his absence. She established a system of tributes (an early form of taxation), organized their lands into governmental units and even established the first stone stone buildings in some major cities. Olha was finally moved to accept the Faith of Christ. She traveled to Constantinople to



receive Holy Baptism. The Emperor, seeing her beauty and inward greatness, asked her to marry him. She said she could not do this before she was baptized; and she asked him to be her Godfather, which he agreed to do. After she was baptized (receiving the name of Helen), the Emperor repeated his proposal of marriage. She answered that now he was her father, through holy Baptism, and that not even among the heathen was it heard of a man marrying his daughter. Gracefully accepting to be outwitted by her, he sent her back to her land with priests and sacred texts and holy icons. Olha tried to convert her son, but Svyatoslav remained a pagan. She had many churches built in their kingdom and undoubtedly she planted the seed of faith in her grandson, St. Volodymyr. She reposed in peace after an illness in 969. Her holy day is July 11.

St. Volodymyr was the son of Svyatoslav. Volodymyr was a pagan in his early life. He was a great conqueror who had many wives and erected many pagan statues in the lands that he ruled over. Upon finding out that other faiths existed beyond his own paganism, he decided to send his envoys out into the world to find out what was true faith on earth. His envoys met with Muslims, but felt that there was no joy among them, and that their faith was very mechanical. The envoys also met with Jews and Catholics in Germany, but were still unimpressed. Everything changed, however, when the envoys arrived in Constantinople. Upon attending Divine Liturgy in Hagia Sophia, the envoys said, "We no longer knew whether we were in heaven or on earth." Taking the word of his envoys, St. Volodymyr had himself and his nation baptized as Christians in 988 AD. St. Volodymyr changed completely after his baptism. He destroyed all the pagan statues that stood in Kyivan Rus', and replaced them with churches. He also attempted to live in peace as much as possible with his neighbors and had only one wife. His holy day is July 15.

They Saw Because They Believed

At that point, two blind men follow the Lord as He was passing by. But if they could not see, how could the blind men know of the Lord's departure as well as His name? Moreover, they called him "Son of David" and asked to be made well. In the two blind men, the entire earlier pre-figuration is complete. The ruler's daughter seems to be from these people, namely, the Pharisees and John's disciples, who already made common cause in testing the Lord.


To these unknowing persons the law gave evidence as to the one from whom they sought a cure. It indicated to them that their Savior in the flesh was of the line of David. It also introduced light to the minds of those who

were blind from past sins. They could not see Christ but were told about Him.

The Lord showed them that faith should not be expected as a result of health but health should be expected because of faith. The blind men saw because they believed; they did not believe because they saw. From this we understand that what is requested must be predicated on faith and that faith must not be exercised because of what has been obtained. If they should believe, He offers them sight. And He charges the believers to be silent, for it was exclusively the task of the Apostles to preach.
